New Editor of Canadian Public Policy/Analyse de politiques

Ken McKenzie has come to the end of his term as editor of *Canadian Public Policy/Analyse de politiques*. Professor McKenzie, as editor, has produced issue after issue of serious, timely and provocative analyses of Canadian public policy issues, with the support of Maureen Church, *CPP/AP*'s journal assistant, associate editors Steve Ambler, Pat Armstrong, Kathy Brock, Jane Friesen, Ron Kneebone, Graham Lowe, Denis Saint-Martin and Scott Davies, as well as book reviews editor Herb Emery. Professor McKenzie has kept turn-around times low at just 118 days and the quality of published articles high. The journal's web presence is strong: over 25,000 articles were downloaded in 2005. The journal's citation impact remains steady and the journal is in good financial shape.

Fortunately, *CPP/AP* has been able to replace one Canada's leading experts in taxation policy with another: James Davies. Professor Davies has been at the University of Western Ontario since 1977, where he was chair of the economics department from 1992 until 2001, and has held visiting appointments at the UN University, University of Munich, Bond University, Tilburg University, University of Essex and the Department of Finance. His work on "The Distributive Effects of Wealth Taxes," was published in the September 1991 issue of *CPP/AP*, while in November, 1995, his paper on "Distributional Effects of the Lifetime Capital Gains Exemption: Single vs. Multi-Year Analysis," appeared. He has also refereed extensively for the journal. He brings to *CPP/AP* experience serving on the editorial board of the *Review of Income and Wealth*, the *Canadian Tax Journal* and the *Canadian Journal of Economics*. Professor Davies' three year term as editor will begin July 1, 2005.

Changes in the CEA Council

Lower membership rate for retirees

As of January 1, 2006, the CEA/ACÉ will be lowering the membership rate for retired faculty to \$25, which is the current student rate. As is the case for students, retired faculty will be asked to provide documentation supporting their status. Retirees may be disappointed to learn that this change was not motivated by concerns about the financial struggles faced by senior scholars. Rather, we believe retirees' demands for CEA membership is relatively elastic, and we are simply engaging in a little price discrimination.

The CEA/ACE's web page, economics.ca, has for many years been ably maintained by Werner Antweiler, the CEA Webmaster (who also, in his spare time, publishes regularly in the *American Economic Review*, *Canadian Journal of Economics/Revue canadienne d'économie*, and similar journals, holds a Chair in International Trade Policy at UBC and hikes the local Vancouver mountains). The CEA/ACE is proud to announce the launch of economics.ca version 2. The new updated web page has multiple features including:

- greatly improved French language sites
- easier navigation
- a front page containing newflashes about conferences, upcoming events, items of general interest to CEA members
- information on current economic indicators
- an enhanced directory of Canadian economists, with features allowing individual CEA members or economics departments to update their own entries

New Initiatives: The Denny-Gaudet Report

Since moving the *Canadian Journal of Economics/Revue canadienne d'économique* to Blackwell Publishers, and holding our annual meetings on our own, the CEA/ACE has generated a series of budget surpluses. This surplus has been due partly to Blackwell's ability to protect our institutional subscription revenue through bundling arrangements, and partly to our low administrative costs. Werner Antweiler's supremely efficient technical support has been key in keeping overheads low. We now have a substantial accumulated surplus.

When former Secretary-Treasurer Professor Michael Denny stepped down from his position, he, together with incoming vice-president Professor Gérard Gaudet, prepared a report considering new initiatives for the Association. Almost all of the suggestions of Denny and Gaudet were adopted, and the Association is proud to announce the following new initiatives:

- one year free CEA membership for new Canadian economics faculty, starting with faculty hired in 2004 (if you have not yet received notification of your membership, please let me know at frances_woolley@carleton.ca)
- funding for area groups. This year the Association has committed \$12,000 to funding area groups that organize sessions at the annual CEA meetings
- a CEA news bulletin, incorporated into economics.ca version 2.

Other initiatives currently in the planning stage include setting up a permanent archive of CEA and CJE/RCE material at the University of Toronto, and setting up an endowment to ensure that the current accumulated surplus is used to sustain the Association well into the future.

The CEA had a healthy surplus in 2004, and is projecting a surplus again for 2005. This article briefly summarizes the results for the 2005 competition and the recent changes to the adjudication procedure for the Economics Committee (Committee 7).

This year, 40% of the applications submitted to Committee 7 were successful, a rate similar to other committees. This rate is lower than last year (43%) and the year before (41%). It is also important to mention that, this year, for most grants, the amounts awarded were less than the amounts requested by the applicants, because of a substantial increase in the number of applications (11%) and amounts requested (17%) for the whole program. In order to maintain a 40% success rate, adjudication committees were asked to apply a 70% global funding rate, taking into account the individual needs of each successful candidate.

Detailed statistics on Table 1 show that, with a success rate of 20% in 2005, applicants from the Atlantic provinces were not as successful as those from other parts of the country. Two other categories of researchers had a relatively low success rate: new scholars with a success rate of 22% and women with 18%. Regarding the success rate of women, the situation can vary considerably from one year to another. However, the success rate for new scholars and applicants from the Atlantic provinces has consistently been far below average, despite the adoption of measures to help improve this situation. This has been a subject for concern for the Council, which is closely monitoring the situation.

Another important point is the changes to adjudication procedures for the Economics Committee implemented during the last two years. In 2004, the Council examined a range of options aimed at simplifying adjudication procedures and controlling costs while maintaining the quality of decisions. A proposal was selected that offered the advantage of reducing the length of

committee meetings by focusing discussion on cases judged most in need of collective deliberation. It was proposed that the new procedure would be tested on the Economics committee. The proposal was submitted to the committee chair, Dr. Schmitt, who suggested significant improvements.

The basic principle is that there is no committee discussion during the final stage of adjudication on files determined by committee consensus to be ranked in the top 15% and the lowest 35%, except for controversial files flagged by members before the meeting. No rankings are provided to the candidates (only scores and the code result) and no committee comments are prepared for the files that are not discussed in Ottawa. However, all the candidates receive the external assessments.

After the first year of experiment, the committee and the observers from the Council concluded that the new process helped reduce the burden overall on committee members and that it improved the quality of decision-making for the mid-ranked applications. They considered that there were enough safeguards to ensure that proposals that were not discussed in Ottawa were treated with fairness. It was therefore decided that the process would be continued for Committee 7 and that more committees should take part in the experiment.

Awards & Other News/Distinctions & Autre Nouvelles

The Canadian Economics Association awards an annual prize in memory of our colleague and former president, Harry G. Johnson. The prize of \$1000 is awarded each year for the best article in the previous year's volume of the *Canadian Journal of Economics*. The selection of the best article in volume 37 (2004) was made by a committee consisting of Rose Anne Devlin (University of Ottawa), Allan Gregory (Queen's University), and Ralph Winter (University of British Columbia). The prize was awarded at the Canadian Economics Association Meetings in May 2005 to **Mukesh Eswaran** and **Ashtok Kotwal** (University of British Columbia) for their article entitled, "A theory of gender differences in parental altruism," which appeared in the November 2004 issue of the journal. This marks the first time that anyone has ever won the Harry Johnson prize twice in a row – Professor Eswaran won the award last year for his work with Curtis Eaton on the evolution of preferences. Professors Eswaran and Kotwal will be donating their award to the UBC economics department.

The Robert Mundell Prize is given out annually to the "young" author or authors of the paper judged to be the best paper published in the Canadian Journal of Economics in the previous calendar year. This year's winner is **Susan Chun Zhu** for her paper on "Trade, product cycles, and inequality within and between countries", which appeared in the November issue of the journal. Professor Zhu holds an MA from Carleton University and a PhD from University of Toronto. She has been at Michigan State University since 2001.

Congratulations to **Ian Keay** and **Cherie Metcalf**, winners of the Vanderkamp Prize for their paper on "Aboriginal Rights, Customary Law and

Renewable Resource Exploitation,” published in the March 2004 issue of *Canadian Public Policy/Analyse de politiques*. In this paper, Key and Metcalf question the Canadian court system’s persistently cautious approach to the interpretation of Aboriginal rights with respect to natural resource extraction. Instead, they argue that most reasonable assumptions regarding Aboriginal sensitivity to the economic and regulatory environment suggest that recognition of aboriginal rights would lead to potentially substantial redistribution of catch and profit, but fairly small changes in the aggregate catch or fish stocks. The Vanderkamp Prize is awarded annually to the best article published in *Canadian Public Policy* during the previous year, in recognition of John Vanderkamp, the first editor and founder of the journal.

The Doug Purvis Memorial Prize is awarded annually to the author(s) of a highly significant, written contribution to Canadian economic policy. The shortlist for the 2004 Prize consisted of:

Erwin Diewert for his contributions to *Consumer Price Index Manual: Theory and Practice* (Geneva: ILO, 2004) and to *Producer Price Index Manual: Theory and Practice* (Washington: IMF, 2004).

The 2004 prize was awarded to **Professor Diewert** for his work on price indices. Although the Purvis Prize usually recognizes a single contribution, Professor Diewert’s work on price indices has in fact been a life-long project. Since his first *Journal of Political Economy* publication in 1971, Professor Diewert has published 83 journal articles, an achievement which has won him numerous honours, including being named a Fellow of the Royal Society of Canada, and a Fellow of the Econometric Society. In the spirit of Doug Purvis, Professor Diewert has also made a sustained contribution to Canadian economic policy, as a longstanding member and Chairman of the Statistics Canada prices advisory committee.

And while shortlisted candidates **David Laidler** and **Bill Robson** will not enjoy the honour of the Purvis Prize, their own work received rich recognition earlier this year, when they were awarded the \$35,000 Donner Prize.

Congratulations to all the winners, and also thank you to the many individuals who put in many hours behind the scenes making hard choices between excellent candidates.
