## MIKE McCRACKEN PRIZE / LE PRIX McCRACKEN

This year there were four winners, Charles M. Beach, Professor of Economics at Queen's University; Garnett Picot, Fellow, School of Policy Studies, Queen's University and until recently Director of Research, Statistics Canada; W. Craig Riddell, Royal Bank Faculty Research Professor, Department of Economics, the University of British Columbia and Ging Wong, Adjunct Professor, School of Policy Studies, Queen's University. The person who nominated this group of four wrote "By their contributions to improving the data available to labour economists, they enabled the growth in Canada over the last decades of world class research on the functioning of labour markets. They also enabled the growth in Canada of evidence based public policy debate and decision making in the areas of education, training, income distribution and poverty, safety net and automatic stabilizer programs, and much more."

Charles M. Beach has taught at Queen's since 1972. He obtained his BA(Hons.) from McGill University and PhD from Princeton University. His research and teaching have been in the areas of applied econometrics, income distribution, labour economics and industrial relations. He was a co-founder of the Canadian Econometric Study Group, co-initiator of the Canadian Household Panel Survey initiative, co-founding member of the Canadian Employment Research Forum (CERF), and Chair of the Data Liberation Initiative. He was also part of the founding Board of the Canadian Employment Research Forum. He has served as adviser to numerous government departments and agencies. From 1995 to 2002, he was Editor of Canadian Public Policy/Analyse de Politiques. He was Director of the John Deutsch Institute from 2001 to 2009

Garnett Picot was until recently Director-General of Research for Statistics Canada. He continues to teach in the School of Policy Studies each summer and is a Research Fellow at both the Institute for Research in Public Policy and Statistics Canada. Mr. Picot has wide-ranging research interests related primarily to labour market analysis. He has written over 50 papers during the past two decades on topics such as immigrant economic integration, earnings inequality, poverty, job stability, worker displacement, and job creation and destruction. He is on the executive committee of both the Canadian Economics Association and the Canadian Labour and Skills Research Network, and was past co-chair of the Canadian Employment Research

Network. He was also part of the founding Board for Canadian Employment Research Forum, and is a past Government Co-Chair of the CERF Board. He also has a strong interest in data development and data access, and was instrumental in the development and implementation of the Research Data Centres that are now on most university campuses in Canada. He holds degrees in electrical engineering and economics.

Garnett Picot is a research fellow at the IRPP, providing advice on the Diversity, Immigration and Integration research program, which investigates the labour market integration of immigrants. He has written more than 50 papers over the past two decades on topics such as immigrant economic integration, earnings inequality, poverty, job stability, worker displacement, and job creation and destruction. He is a fellow at the Queen's University School of Policy Studies, where he also teaches, and a research fellow at Statistics Canada, where he was until recently director general of research.

W. Craig Riddell is Royal Bank Faculty Research Professor in the Department of Economics at the University of British Columbia and Academic Director of the Canadian Labour Market and Skills Research Network. His teaching and research interests are in labour economics, labour relations and public policy. Current research is focused on skill formation, education and training, unemployment and labour market adjustment, unemployment insurance, program evaluation, immigration, and unionization. He has published numerous articles in academic journals, including the American Economic Review, Canadian Journal of Economics, Economic Journal, Econometrica, Journal of Labor Economics, Journal of Human Resources, and Review of Economics and Statistics. Professor Riddell is former Head of the Department of Economics at UBC, Past-President of the Canadian Economics Association and former Academic Co-Chair of CERF (the Canadian Employment Research Forum). He currently serves on Statistics Canada's Advisory Committee on Labour and Income Statistics and on the Board of Directors of the Centre for the Study of Living Standards. In 2007-8 he was a member of the Expert Panel on Older Workers established by the Government of Canada.

**Ging Wong** is currently with the Queen's University, School of Policy Studies where he is a Fellow with the Centre for Studies on Democracy and Diversity and an Adjunct Professor teaching courses he developed that have become valued parts of the curriculum in the School of Policy Studies. He is also an adjunct professor at Wuhan University in China where he has played a long term development role.

Over the course of his career, he has established a world wide reputation as an expert and practitioner in labour market policy and program evaluation. In his 28 years of public service, he served as an executive at HRDC where he built up and ran what for years was Ottawa's best and biggest program evaluation group. He also held positions at the Privy Council Office and Heritage Canada. In total, his work has ranged from competition policy analysis to the evaluation of immigration, employment, unemployment, public pensions, cultural and heritage programs, to horizontal policy management and policy capacity building at the Privy Council Office. He was also part of the founding Board for CERF (the Canadian Employment Research Forum), he is a past Government Co-Chair of the CERF Board, and he serves on the current CERF Board.

## HARRY JOHNSON PRIZE / LE PRIX HARRY JOHNSON

The Harry Johnson prize is awarded each year for the article judged to be the best published in the *CJE* in the previous calendar year. The prizes are determined by a three person committee. This year's committee consisted of Merwan Engineer from University of Victoria (who acted as chair), Anke Kessler from Simon Fraser University, and Chris Worswick from Carleton University. This is quite a big task because it requires looking at all the approximately 60 papers published in the *CJE* in a year. David Green would very much like to thank all three committee members. He is particularly grateful to Merwan, who agreed to serve as chair of the committee for two years in a row because of a change in the composition of the committee. The Johnson prize comes with a \$5,000 award.

This year's Harry Johnson Prize winners are Wen-Hao Chen, Social Policy Division (OECD) and Statistics Canada, and Jean-Yves Duclos, Departément d'Économique and CIRPEE, Université Laval, for their paper "Testing for poverty dominance: an application to Canada", pp. 781-803, August 2011. The runner-up was Ross D. Hickey, University of British Columbia, and David S. Jacks, Simon Fraser University, for their paper "Nominal rigidities and retail price dispersion in Canada over the twentieth century", pp. 749-780, August 2011.

## ROBERT MUNDELL PRIZE / LE PRIX ROBERT MUNDELL

The Robert Mundell Prize is awarded each year for the article judged to be the best published in the *CJE* in the previous year by a young researcher (roughly a researcher who is pre-tenure or completed his or her Ph.D. less than seven years before). As above, this year's committee consisted of Merwan Engineer from University of Victoria, Anke Kessler from Simon Fraser University, and Chris Worswick from Carleton University. The Mundell prize comes with a \$3,000 award.

This year's Robert Mundell Prize winners are Joel Stiebale, Rheinisch-Westfälisches Institut für Wirtschaftsforschung, Essen, and Michaela Trax, Ruhr Graduate School in Economics, Essen, for "The effects of cross-border M&As on the acquirer's domestic performance: firm-level evidence", pp. 957-990, August 2011. The runner-up was Mathias Herzing of the Department of Economics, Stockholm University for "Does hidden information make trade liberalization more fragile?", pp. 461-579, May 2011.

# JOHN KENNETH GALBRAITH PRIZE / LE PRIX JOHN KENNETH GALBRAITH

The Progressive Economics Forum (PEF) is proud to announce that Mike McCracken, Chair and CEO of Informetrica Ltd. In Ottawa, has won the 3<sup>rd</sup> biennial Galbraith Prize for a lifetime contribution to economics and social justice in Canada.

Mr. McCracken co-founded Informetrica in 1972, after working at the Economics Council of Canada, where he helped build the Council's CANDIDE macroeconomic simulation model. For 40 years, Informetrica has been a prominent and credible source of economic and policy analysis in fields such as industry and energy studies, macroeconomic and monetary policy, input-output analysis, aboriginal economic development, and healthcare.

The Galbraith Prize is named in honour of the late John Kenneth Galbraith, and was inaugurated in 2007 with a lecture by James Galbraith, son of the legendary Canadian-born economist and commentator. It is supported by an endowment raised by the PEF, Canada's network of progressive economists. Mel Watkins (University of Toronto) and Kari Polanyi Levitt (McGill University) were joint winners in 2008, and John Loxley (University of Manitoba) received the prize in 2010.

This year's winner was selected by a five-member panel composed of the three previous Galbraith winners, Tony Dean (former secretary to the Ontario cabinet), and Morna Ballantyne (a prominent trade unionist and founder of the unionleadership.ca website).

In awarding the prize to Mr. McCracken, the judges mentioned in particular his long-time advocacy of continued public-service provision in Canada, and his consistent support for many community and social-justice groups working to protect and expand public programs like healthcare. In an era when many governments are implementing short-sighted austerity measures that threaten the quality of public services, social inclusion, and macroeconomic stability, Mr. McCracken's outspoken views on these topics are especially timely.

Mr. McCracken presented his topic "The Search for Full Employment: My Continuing Battle for the Unemployed" and received the \$2,000 award at a reception hosted by the PEF at the Canadian Economics Association (CEA) annual conference in Calgary on June 8 and 9.

The CEA itself has previously recognized Mr. McCracken's contributions to the profession by inaugurating a McCracken Award for the Advancement of Economic Statistics.

### THE KILLAM PRIZE / LE PRIX KILLAM

Five prizes of \$100,000 are awarded each year in recognition of outstanding career achievements (1 prize in each of the 5 fields). This year, the winner in the Social Sciences was John Whalley of the Department of Economics at the University of Western Ontario.

Killam Trusts Managing Trustee George Cooper noted, "The Killam Prizes honour the achievements of Canadian researchers and scientists. The 2012 winners are accomplished experts who have made significant contributions to their fields and it is only fitting that they receive one of the most prestigious research awards open to Canadian scholars."

The Killam Prize ceremony was held at Rideau Hall in Ottawa on May 15. The Killam Program at the Canada Council for the Arts also includes the Killam Research Fellowships, which support scholars engaged in research projects of outstanding merit in the humanities, social sciences, natural sciences, health sciences, engineering and interdisciplinary studies within these fields.

### DOUG PURVIS PRIZE / LE PRIX DOUG PURVIS

The book by Charles M. Beach, Queen's University, the late Alan G. Green, Queen's University, and Christopher Worswick, Carleton University, *Toward Improving Canada's Skilled Immigration Policy: An Evaluation Approach* (C.D. Howe Institute) was one of the four finalists for the Donner Prize and won the Doug Purvis Prize. The Doug Purvis Prize is awarded each year to an outstanding publication in Canadian public policy.

### VANDERKAMP PRIZE / LE PRIX VANDERKAMP

Byron Spencer and Frank Denton, both of McMaster University, were selected as the winners of the John Vanderkamp Prize for the best paper published in the *Canadian Public Policy /Analyse de Politiques* in 2011 for their paper in the June issue (37:2): "Age of Pension Eligibility, Gains in Life Expectancy, and Social Policy". Somewhat prescient in their analysis given the recent announcement of the federal government concerning Canada's Old Age Security benefits, the authors investigated the consequences of increasing the age of pension eligibility for the sustainability of Canada's pay-as-you-go financed public pensions.

The runners-up for the 2011 Vanderkamp Prize were James Davies, University of Western Ontario, and Stanley Winer, Carleton University, for their paper in the September issue (37:3) "Closing the 49<sup>th</sup> Parallel: An Unexplored Episode in Canadian Economic and Political History". Davies and Winer examine the fiscal policy impacts of reduced labour mobility between Canada and the United States following the 1965 *US Immigration Act* that remain in force until 1990. Given the profound changes in fiscal policy in Canada that accompanied the de-coupling of the labour markets of the two countries, their work shows the surprising lack of attention to some of the longer term, slower moving forces that shape Canadian policy.

The winner and runners-up were selected by a multi-disciplinary committee who reviewed all papers published in the 2011 volume of *Canadian Public Policy/Analyse de Politiques*. The Vanderkamp Prize is awarded annually and is worth \$2,000.

# FELLOWS OF THE CANADIAN ECONOMICS ASSOCIATION, 2012: DAVID LAIDLER AND MICHAEL PARKIN

Two eminent Canadian monetary economists and macroeconomists, David Laidler and Michael Parkin, both professors emeritus at the University of Western Ontario, are being honored as Fellows of the Canadian Economics Association in 2012. Created in 2010, the title of Fellow of the Canadian Economics Association is conferred to recognize the achievements and contribution to the discipline of the most prominent economists who have spent a significant portion of their career in Canada.

The theme of David Laidler's research is summed up by the title of his 1988 Presidential address to the CEA, "Taking Money Seriously" (CJE 1988) and in the titles of selections of his articles, Essays on Money and Inflation (1975), Monetarist Perspectives (1982), Taking Money Seriously (1990), Money and Macroeconomics (1997), and Macroeconomics in Retrospect (2004). He has taken a leading role in the monetarist tradition of analysis of the crucial role of money in determining inflation and short-run economic fluctuations ever since, as a doctoral student at the University of Chicago, he was a research assistant for Milton Friedman and Anna J. Schwartz's Monetary History of the United States, 1867-1960 (1963). David Laidler has been an eloquent advocate and defender of Friedman's Chicago monetarism both upholding monetary explanations of inflation, and the absence of longrun real stimulus from monetary expansion, against Keynesians (Old, New, and Post) and insisting on the importance of money for short-run real fluctuations against New Classical claims that any systematic monetary policy will be neutral. His textbook *The Demand for Money – Theories and* Evidence was published in four English language editions from 1969 to 1993. as well as in Spanish, French, Italian, Japanese, and Chinese, while his Introduction to Microeconomics had four English language editions from 1974 to 1994 (the last two co-authored) and was translated into Spanish, Polish, Italian, and Bulgarian. The first of his family to attend university, David Laidler grew up in Newcastle on Tyne, England, where his father had a fish and chips shop. A graduate of the London School of Economics, Syracuse University, and the University of Chicago, he has been a Fellow of the Royal Society of Canada since 1982, and was President of the Canadian Economics Association in 1987-88. Distinguished Fellow of the History of Economics Society in 2009, David Laidler has championed the need for macroeconomic theorists and policy analysts to have a historical perspective on how their field has evolved, notably in his The Golden Age of the Quantity Theory: The Development of Neoclassical Monetary Economics, 1870-1914 (1991) and Fabricating the Keynesian Revolution: Studies of the Inter-war Literature on Money, the Cycle, and Unemployment (1999). He has also been an influential writer about Canadian monetary policy: The Great Canadian Disinflation: The Economics and Politics of Monetary Policy in Canada, 1988-1993 (with William Robson, 1993), shared the first Doug Purvis Memorial Prize for a work of excellence in Canadian economic policy, and Two Percent Target: Canadian Monetary Policy Since 1991 (with William Robson, 2004) won the Donner Prize for outstanding book of the year on Canadian public policy. After teaching at the University of Manchester and the University of California, Berkeley, David Laidler joined the University of Western Ontario in 1975, and was Bank of Montreal Professor there from 2000 to 2005. Two volumes on David Laidler's Contributions to Economics have been edited by Robert Leeson (Palgrave Macmillan, 2010).

Michael Parkin, another eminent monetarist professor at the University of Manchester, also joined the University of Western Ontario in 1975. After leaving school at the age of sixteen, he was a cost accountant in the English steel industry for five years, and then in 1960 took up the study of economics at the University of Leicester (to which he returned to accept an honorary doctorate in 2010). The author of 38 articles in refereed scholarly journals, 57 articles in edited volumes and conference proceedings (including New Palgrave articles on adaptive expectations and on inflation), 18 discussions and comments in refereed journals, edited volumes, and conference proceedings, and 35 articles in bank reviews and other periodicals and pamphlets, he is also the author or co-author (often with Dr. Robin Bade) of eighty (80!) editions, in many languages and national editions (from Indonesia and China to Brazil and Mexico, with 2011 editions in Britain, the US, Australia, and Canada of the introductory book) of two best-selling textbooks: Economics (introductory) and Modern Macroeconomics (intermediate). These textbooks, and their ancillary materials (including software and websites), have been tremendously successful and influential. The managing editor of the Canadian Journal of Economics from 1982 to 1987. Michael Parkin was President of the Canadian Economics Association in 1997-98, giving a Presidential address on "Unemployment, Inflation and Monetary Policy" (CJE 1998), reflecting on developments in macroeconomic theory and proposing the extension of existing dynamic general equilibrium models to a richer vector of stochastic shocks as a path to developing quantitative models adequate to informing the design and conduct of monetary policy.

The Canadian Economics Association honours these two great scholars for their contributions to macroeconomics and monetary economics, discussion and analysis of monetary policy, and the teaching of economics.

#### **OBITUARY**

### **Professor Peter C. Dooley**

Professor Peter C. Dooley died peacefully on June 19, 2012, following a lengthy struggle with a brain tumour. The highly regarded Economics professor spent most of his professional career at the University of Saskatchewan, from 1966 until he retired in 2005. He was a talented teacher who wrote several important textbooks on economics, including *Elementary Price Theory* (1967, 1973) and *Introductory Macroeconomics* (1975). Professor Dooley pursued an active research program on the history of economic thought, publishing regularly throughout his career and into his retirement. His final and most ambitious book, *The Labour Theory of Value*, was published in 2005.

He received a B.A. in 1959 from Grinnell College, and a Ph.D. in 1974 from Cornell University, earning several prestigious fellowships to support his studies. While at Grinnell, he met Anne More, the love of his life. They were married in 1959.

Over the years, Professor Dooley was also a Visiting Scholar at the University of Cambridge, Visiting Senior Fellow at the University of Stirling, Visiting Professor at the University of Venice and Visiting Fellow at the University of Glasgow. He lectured across Canada and abroad, and worked at various times as an author, researcher, labour negotiator, economic consultant and advisor. He was a member of the Canadian Economics Association, the American Economic Association, the History of Economics Society and the Royal Economic Society.

Professor Dooley was extremely active in the University's Faculty Association where he developed a reputation as a fierce defender of the underdog and a highly effective negotiator. He served on numerous university committees and a lengthy term as President of the Faculty Association. The Canadian Association of University Teachers honoured his contributions with its Dedicated Service Award.

A passionate observer of world affairs and insatiable traveler, Peter spent many happy hours in the kitchen cooking delicious meals for his family and friends, working in his magnificent garden, and designing and constructing beautiful furniture. He was often seen driving his bright blue vintage Triumph Spitfire down prairie roads. Peter enjoyed the outdoors as a hunter and fisherman, and was always ready to watch a football or baseball game to cheer on his Chicago Bears or Toronto Blue Jays. He was blessed with a tremendous intellect and unfailing memory. Everyone who knew him enjoyed his superbly clever yet exceptionally dry wit.

Peter and Anne had four children, Brigid (Eric Tremblay), Kevin (Sherry Biscope), Adam (Lynn Billard) and Nathan. Their six wonderful grandchildren, Zachary Tremblay, Ethan Billard Dooley, Alexandre Tremblay, Aidan Billard Dooley, Michael Tremblay and Alice Dooley all remember Peter as a loving and supportive Granddaddy. Although they are now spread far and wide, they remain a close and loving family who now grieve a great loss.

A celebration of Peter's life will be held for family and friends on Thursday, June 28<sup>th</sup>, commencing at 3:00 p.m. at the Faculty Club, 101 Administration Place, on the campus of the University of Saskatchewan.

### CWEN/RFE 2012 Young Researcher Prize

Our 2012 bi-annual Young Researcher Prize has been awarded. We had many wonderful nominations. This year's winner is Matilde Bombardini (British Columbia) and our runner-up recipient is Mara Lederman (Toronto).

The committee selected Professor Bombardini on the basis of her influential and innovative work in political economy, international trade and the intersection of the two. Her work features elegant game theoretic modeling and careful empirical work, often accompanied by the construction of new data sets. In a series of papers on lobbying, she has investigated how firm size heterogeneity influences how industries lobby for trade protection; how lobbies attempting to influence policy make trade-offs between delivering votes and delivering campaign contributions; and the role of information transmission and facilitating access to politicians in the lobbying process. In her work on international trade, she has studied the effect of skill dispersion on the pattern of trade and the effects of domestic competition on export performance. Her work has been extensively cited and published in journals such as the *American Economic Review*, the *Journal of International Economics* and other top field journals.
